



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Section of Working Drawing Showing a Three-Level Hierarchy of

be considered on the *lowest* level of the hierarchy. However, the architectural graphics of the middle level should remain clear. The *highest* level of the hierarchy should include references to larger-scale information, such as enlarged floor plans at $1/4'' = 1' \cdot 0''$ or wall sections at $3/4'' = 1' \cdot 0''$. Figure 33-1 is an example of a section of a working drawing with no hierarchy of graphic content. Compare this to Figure 33-2, which reflects the three-level hierarchy of graphic content. Figure 33-3 shows three illustrations of the same section of floor plan separated into the *lowest, middle*, and *highest* levels.
